



Relief Fund Interim Report | Dec. 2022

More than 100 community partners have come together to create the Oregon Worker Relief Fund, a rapid community-based system that provides temporary financial support to Oregonians who have been excluded from other safety net programs during the COVID-19 pandemic.

Amount Disbursed

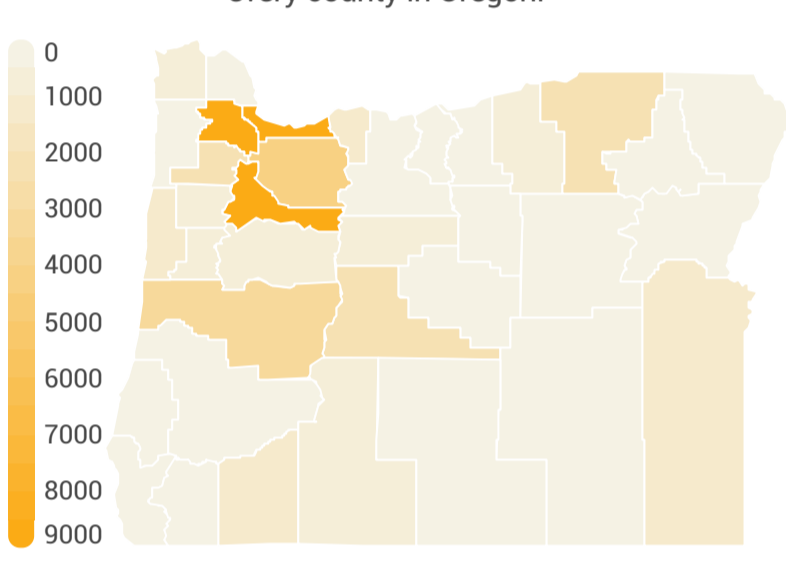
- \$114,635,873**
 OWRF has delivered over **\$114.6 million** in disaster relief throughout Oregon's immigrant communities.
- \$78,262,313**
First-time applicants received over **\$78.2 million** in disaster relief assistance.
- \$36,373,560**
Second-round applicants received over **\$36.3 million** in disaster relief assistance after having been approved as first-time applicants.
- \$2,014**
Average aid disbursed to Oregon's immigrant community.

Number of Recipients Who Received Aid

- 59,653 Total Individuals**
 Have received aid since the start of OWR in May 2020.
- 43,255 First-Time Applicants**
 Have received aid since the start of OWR in May 2020.
- 16,398 Second-Round Applicants**
 Have received aid since OWR approved issuing an additional round of support back in August 2021.

Financial Relief Disbursed Throughout Oregon

OWRF's presence in Oregon is significant. OWRF has provided financial relief in every county in Oregon.

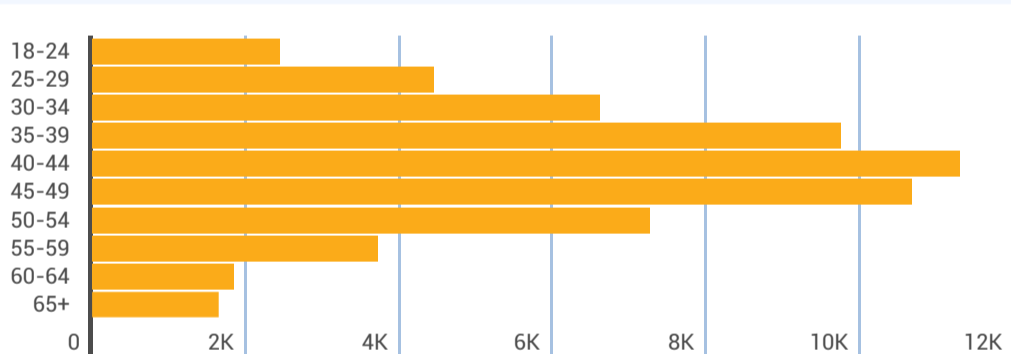


Family Size of OWRF Recipients

Oregonian immigrant families served by the OWRF ranged in size from single-person households to large families.

- 82% of OWRF recipients** had at least 1 dependent minor child
- 63% of OWRF recipients** had at least 2 dependent minor children

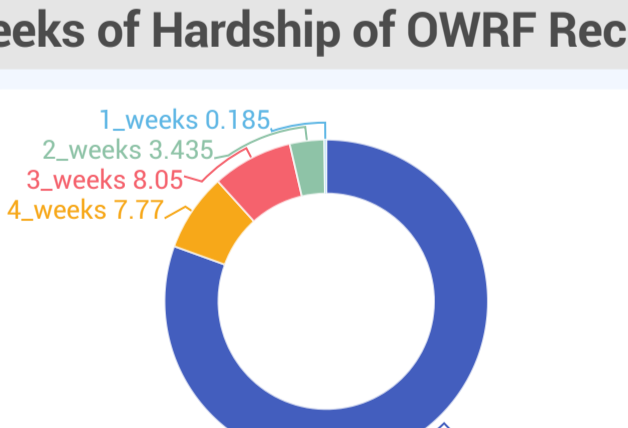
Age Groups of OWRF Recipients



Employment Industry of OWRF Recipients

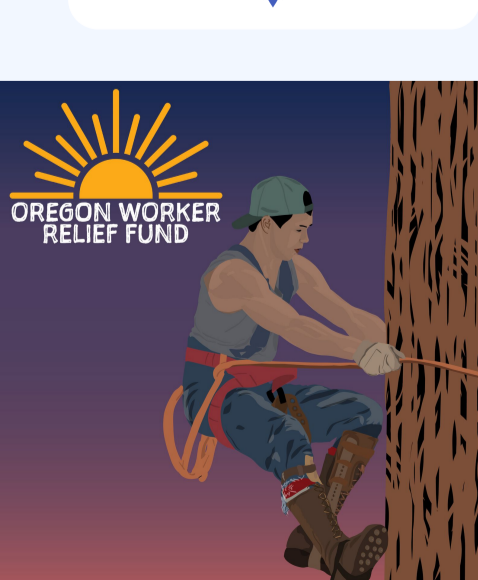
- Agriculture: 34.5

Weeks of Hardship of OWRF Recipients



At the time of applying for relief, **80% of applicants** indicated having 5 or more weeks of hardship as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic.
