Climate Change Fund (CCF) Interim Report | May 2023

More than 100 community partners have come together to create the Oregon Worker Relief Fund, a rapid community-based system that provides temporary financial support, through programs like The Climate Change Fund, that supports Oregonian agricultural workers who lose work or wages because of extreme heat or smoke.

Amount Disbursed

\$ 11,741,250
CCF has delivered over \$11 million in disaster relief throughout Oregonians.

Average aid disbursed to Oregon's immigrant community members who lost work and wages due to hazardous heat and smoke conditions.

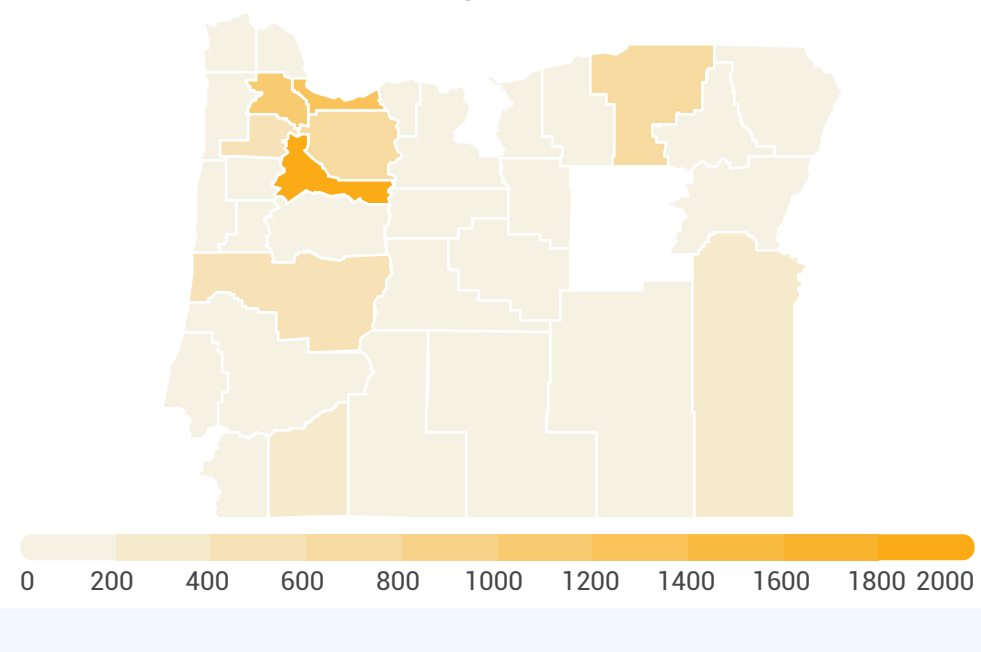
Number of Recipients Who Received Aid

97% Approval Rate
Over 97% of applicants receive aid through CCF.

Financial Relief Disbursed Throughout Oregon

OWR's presence in Oregon is significant. CCF has provided financial relief in 34 of 36 Oregon counties.

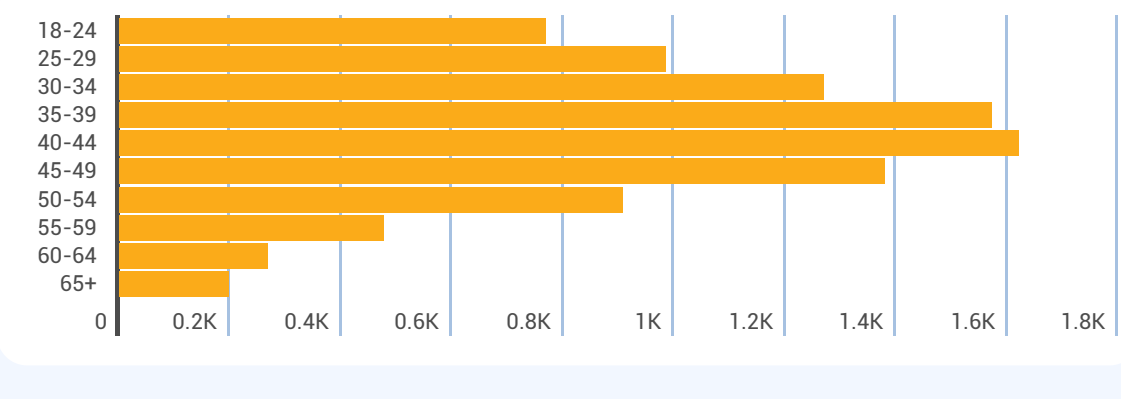


Family Size of OWRF Recipients

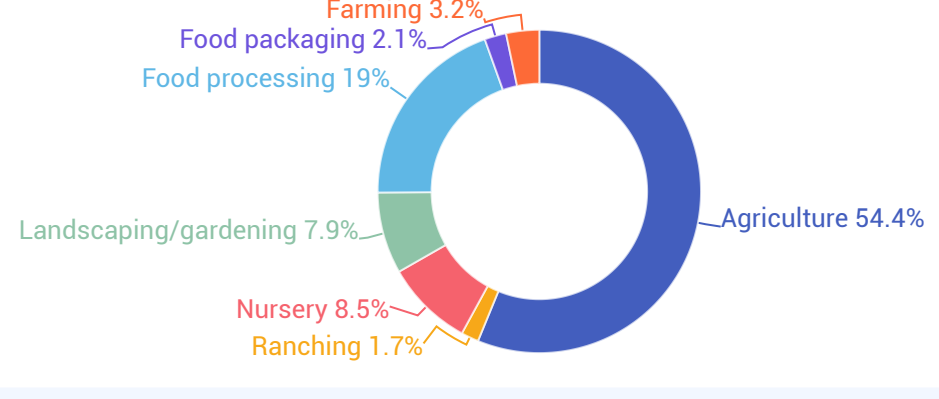
Oregonian immigrant families served by the OWRF ranged in size from single-person households to large families.

- 17% of CCF recipients had at least 1 dependent minor child
- 66% of CCF recipients had at least 2 dependent minor children

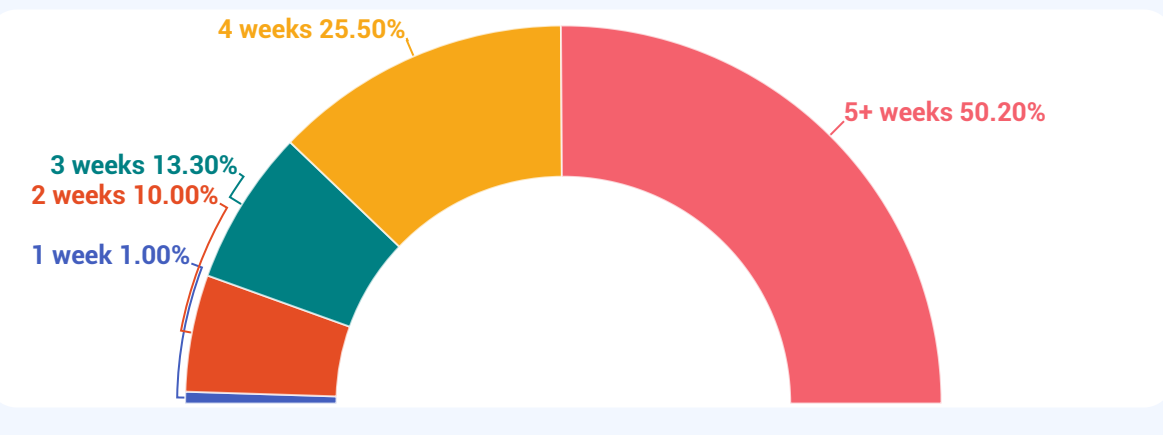
Age Groups of CCF Recipients
